PARIS, Dec. 18 .- At the Eyraud trial to-day Dr. Bouardel, who was deputed to examine into the mental condition of Mlle. Bompard, expressed the convictoin that she was perfectly responsible for her actions, although she would come under the category of "morally deficient," being a person that would commit a crime with indifference. Dr. Sucreste, the physician of the Bompard household, said he had hypnotized Gabrielle, and believed it, possible that Eyraud had. Dr. Brouardel denied the influence or hypnotism, and a stormy scene ensued. Dr. Voisin, a police physician, swore that he had hypnotized Gabrielle but declined to enter into details.
