SINGLE TAX AGAIN. If Mr. Yates should write forever he will never convince us that it is right to allow the rich owner of personal property to escape taxation and place all the burdens upon the land owner. The thing is not right and no argument can make it right.

The lands involved are said to contain by measurement 323 acres and two roods plantation measure and the annual rent is 89 pounds sterling with ten shillings additional as "duties."
