The seed of some new fine varieties is often sent out before the variety is "fixed;" which means that they have not been selected long enough to fix, or set, the type or variety. In such cases the planter may have a plant which is very much better than others, and which would be of value if he could get any number of plants exactly like it. This could be very easily done in this by loud cheering and enthusiasm.
