Lightning In Arizona. THE DALLES, Or., Feb. 19th, 1892. Editor of the Chronicle:

Having seen the an item going the Having seen the an item going the rounds of the papers I feel it as my duty and relief is always sure to follow. I to contradict it. It is stated in the item that there has not been but one thunder storm in Arizona in the time mentioned. I lived in Arizona the last eleven years, and during that three years a half heard more dreadful,

deafening thunder, and saw more fearful lightning than I aver saw in three times three years and a half any where else. It was a thing of general remark when I first arrived in the territory in November 1881, that there had been seven persons killed by lightning within the year. During the following year I was over the ground or near the spot where four of the seven were killed. 


