> Prohibition and Free Trade. Editor Chronicle:

A few of the citizens of our city, including myself, were enticed last evening to attend an alleged temperance meeting at the court house, to hear Messrs. Wolfenbarger and Huckins present their views on the prohibition question, by both song and speech. The first part of the program was well rendered and received, but the second part by Mr. Wolfenbarger, (Wolf-in-beargear), was the most rank free trade speech that I have ever heard.

He started out by comparing the Mills and McKinley bills, with a leaning very much in favor of the former, stating that the latter was a piece of the most iniquitous legislation that was ever perpetrated on the American people; bill was before congress, there was only an average difference of seven per cent. between it and the then existing tariff, but that the McKinley bill, which passed in 1890, increased the average tariff from forty-seven to sixty per cent.
