CRICAGO, June 2 .- Advices give further details of the loss of life and the destruction of property by storms and cyclones in the southwest. Lott, Tex., caused the greatest havoc, sweeping everything before it, over a space of a quarter of a mile wide and several miles long. Houses were utterly demolished. Many people escaped injury by entering cyclone cellars, but five or six are known FISH to be killed, and a number were injured, some fatally. These states will cast 290 votes in the convention. The president would lack 155 of a majority if he had to depend on FACTIONS them alone. An Old Mine Sold.

SPOKANE, June 6 .- A deal was consummated in this city, on Saturday by which W. P. Haskell, one of Spokane's most prominent citizens, will acquire for himself and an eastern syndicate one of the most historic, largest and richest mining properties in the United States. In fact it is the first mining property of which there is any record in what is now the United States. It is the old Copper canyon, in the wilds of New Mexico, but which is now only twenty-two miles from a railroad that has recently penetrated the heart of the country from which the Montezumas extracted fabulous wealth long before the advent of the Spaniards. The history of this, the first scene of mining operations in this conntry, is quite interesting considering the great proportions to which the mining interests have grown from the time the ancient workings were in successful operation until the present day, when so much interest of the same nature centers around Spokane. The Copper canyon was worked in A. D. 1540 at the time of the Spanish invasion.
