THE OREGON CONSTITUTION.

Permitted to judge the future of the Oregon assembly by the first four days, there is some prospect that measures may be adopted to secure needed amendments to our foisted state constitution.

The document provides that no county in the state shall incur an indebtedness exceeding in amount the debt of the county at the time of the adoption of the constitution and five thousand dollars additional.

The debt in many counties has become a grievous burden, and an effort will be made to lighten it by having the legislature pass an act enabling the counties to fund the debt at a lower rate of interest than is now paid upon it.

The Torrey bankrupt bill, which is a good measure and one badly needed, may become a law at this session of congress. It is in the interest of honest insolvents, and business men all over the country welcome its adoption.

In Mr. Ladd's will he gave the sum of \$450,000 in trust to be invested in revenue-producing property, either real or personal or both, and shall be kept so invested for educational or charitable uses, or both, for the benefit of the people of the state of Oregon.

An interesting case affecting steamboat men has been decided by Judge Hanford of Seattle. In the suit of McKinnon vs. the Oregon Improvement company, in which the plaintiff claimed \$20,000 damages for bodily injuries.
