THE STRANGLERS.

It was not always thus. The O. R. & N. Co., who built the line, were held in high esteem. Its officials were, for the most part, Oregon men, who grew up in our generous atmosphere with some sort of regard to the rights of their fellow men.

With the advent of the U. P. management came trouble. Arrogance and intolerance on the part of the officials themselves chilled the former friendships, and a system of oppression was begun that drew the last dollar of profit out of the farmer, and rendered legitimate merchandising precarious, the reflex action of which affected for ill every citizen of the country.
