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WANT HIM IMPEACHED

Cleveland's Arrogant Assumption of Power.

STORM OF INDIGNATION ROUSED

The Administration Sees Its Very Grievous Mistake and May Attempt to Rectify It.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14.—In leading editorials on the Hawaiian situation this morning both the Examiner, democratic, and the Chronicle, republican, call for the impeachment of President Cleveland.

The Examiner says: "If while congress was in session he scorned to consult it and sent his herald to Honolulu to declare war between the United States and the provisional government of the islands, whose regularly commissioned minister has been officially received at Washington, then Grover Cleveland should be impeached and ousted from the presidency."

The Chronicle says: "When the instructions were given Minister Willis, congress was in session. Mr. Cleveland informed congress through a committee that he had no further communication to make. He was at that moment engaged in secretly preparing, or rather he had secretly prepared, to make war upon and overthrow the government of a friendly state. Congress alone has power under the constitution to declare war. Mr. Cleveland, for his usurpation, should be impeached."

A Storm of Indignation

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—A Washington special says: "Either dissolute Queen Lili has been put on the Hawaiian throne by force, or she is not back there yet. This seems to be the situation. Sensational stories are afloat about a change in the administration's Hawaiian policy."

ANOTHER USURPATION

Extraordinary Authority to Minister Willis.

COMMANDER OF OUR NAVAL FORCES

He Holds Such an Order Signed by Cleveland—Dolph in Favor of Annexation.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—A Washington special says: "In anticipation of the condition of affairs which would arise should the provisional government give Willis his passports, the administration has adopted the extraordinary course of providing him with independent authority to command the naval forces in the harbor of Honolulu."

Under the ordinary rules of international law, Willis would not be minister if his passports were given him by the provisional government, and he would have no authority to call on the naval forces of this country for any purpose whatever. To guard against this contingency, orders to the commanding officers of the naval forces were given him, signed by the president, directing the commanding officers to obey any orders coming from Willis, regardless of his official relations to the Hawaiian government.

Senator Dolph's Opinion

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—Upon being asked by the Associated Press reporter for his opinion upon the attitude of the present administration toward Hawaii, Senator Dolph said he did not wish to be quoted as criticizing the administration because of his membership of the committee on foreign relations.
