Both Legs Cut Off. PHTSBURG, Pa. Nov. 16 .- Daniel Reardon, an employe of the Black Diamond steel works, was run over by an engine on the Junction railroad last evening. One of his legs was cut entirely off and the other hung on by mere shreds of flesh. The severed leg lay between the rails, while the crushed limb hung over the rails. Before assistance arrived, Reardon recovered from the shock sufficiently to realize the seriousness of the accident. With tears in his eyes he looked at the severed member, and then at his other torn and lacerated leg, put his hand in his pocket, took out a knife and cut the few remaining shreds of flesi, and laid the limb beside the other. When the doctor arrived he ordered his removal to St. Francis' hospital, where his injuries were dressed. Physicians say there is a possible chance of his recovery. The injured man is 30 years old and married.
