WILMINGTON, Cal., Sept. 17.—F. J. Weldt, justice of the peace, committed suicide this morning, severing an artery. He was 35 years old, and recently had been renominated for justice of the peace.

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 17.—It is stated that Secretary of State Waite has reported to Governor Markham the loss of several important documents in his office, supposed to have been stolen by parties visiting the office.

SANTA FE, N. M., Sept. 14.—James Barrett, murderer, was executed by Sheriff Kemp at Eddy this afternoon.

HAZLETON, Pa., Sept. 17.—A premature blast occurred at Honeybrook colliery today by which John Demtsha was killed, and James Matsuki, Aliesco Trimeppno and Giovanni Petro were injured.
