WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 .- Secretary Carlisle has decided to accept the Stewart syndicate bid for the entire issue of \$50,-000,000 bonds. The figure offered by the syndicate was 117.077. The following official statement was made at the treasury: The secretary of the treasury has accepted the proposal of John A. Stewart, president of the United States A GALA DAY IN ST. PETERSBURG Trust Company, and his associates, to purchase the entire issue of the 5 per cent bonds, amounting to \$50,000,000, at \$117,077 and accrued interest from November 1st.
