WHY PEOPLE WORSHIP GOLD.

This is a relic of barbarism and has no basis in actual value. The Capital National bank, of Salem, at its annual meeting declared a semi-annual dividend of 5 per cent on its capital stock out of the earnings of the past six months. The report of the cashier shows that this bank has returned in net earnings to its shareholders since its organization, nine years ago, \$79,516, or \$4,514 more than 100 per cent on its entire capital stock.
