

She brought a message from Admiral Ting offering to surrender Wei-Hai-Wei and the vessels, providing the lives of the soldiers, crews and foreigners are spared.

Captain Nurous reported that the formal surrender was yet to be arranged.

The commander of the second Japanese army, in his official report of the operations before Wei-Hai-Wei, says the losses from the 20th of January to the 1st of February were 83 killed, including General Oteara and three other officers. During the same period 700 of the enemy were killed.
