The completion of the road wou d send all the traffic from Mitchell, Waldron and the Upper John Day to The Dalles, and would tend to keep that section in this county. Unless they can have better roads to the county seat, they will be compelled to cut loose from Wasco and organize a county of their own, and no one could blame them for

Forbidden to Pasture It.

Some time since THE CHRONICLE publist ed a statement that there was nothing in the law under which the Cascade reservation was created that prevented the pasturing of stock on the reservation. The matter has again come up under the ruling of the commissioner, who takes a different view of the matter. Recently application was made to Hon. W. R.
