The whole river lay before the eye, and all its imperfections and perversions from a smoothly flowing stream were easily discernible. Just below Celilo the fail is very sudden and percipitous, and a great deal of work will have to be done to overcome the difficulty. At this point there is nothing like the phenomenon spoken of further down the river. and the canal would have to be blasted out of the solid rock.

Mr. Day is of the opinion that the hip canal is preferable to a boat railway, and can be built for about one half the cost as estimated by the board of government engineers. They reported in the neighborhood of \$4,000,000, and a half, we will all admit, is a rather material reduction.

Mr. Day returned home this morning, and will, in a short time, send out, at his own expense, a party of engineers, who will survey the route as pointed out yesterday and make a profile map.
