Something of Its History, Location and Output.

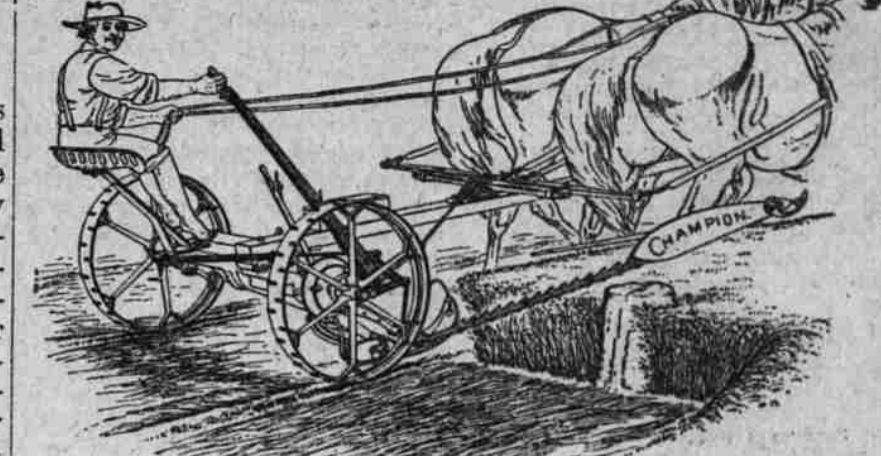
