Accident at the Pile Driver.

An accident happened yesterday afternoon at Rockland whereby L. Sands, foreman of the constructing gang of the D. P. & A. N. Co., lost his life.

From the testimony before the coroner's jury, which was held this morning, it was gathered that Mr. Sands had been somewhat under the influence of liquor and to this fact was probably due in a measure at least, the accident.

Coroner Butts summoned as a jury Henry Clough, R. W. Crandall, C. L. Schmidt, B. H. Thurston, Geo. W. Rowland and J. F. Root, who listened to the testimony of W. S. La Comp, J. F. Staniers, W. A. Maddron, W. F. Moabus, T. W. Maloney and W. E. Waud.

We, the undersigned coroner's jury, empaneled to inquire into the cause of the death of one L. Sands, find as follows:

That said L. Sands was an American citizen, born and raised in the state of Maine; that he was about 48 years old, and about 5 feet 10 1/2 inches in height, of the weight of nearly 165 pounds, light complexioned, light hair, heavy light colored moustache and blue eyes.

That said L. Sands while following his occupation, that of a foreman on a pile driver, at The Dalles, Oregon, was struck on the head by a falling pile, which was the result of an unavoidable accident and which caused his death, on the 7th of October, 1895.

We, the jury from the evidence given, are of the opinion that no blame attaches to any one.

Dated this 8th day of October, 1895. The funeral will take place from the undertaking rooms of Crandall & Burget tomorrow morning at 9:30.

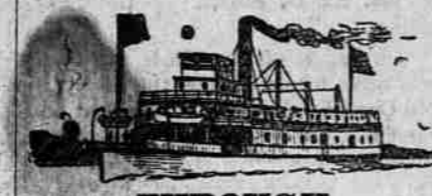

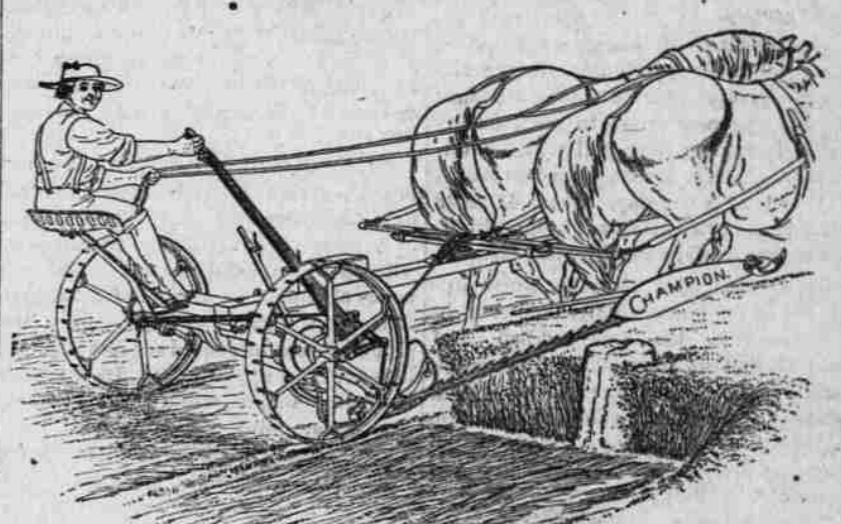

THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, offers free tuition to all students. Young men can obtain board, lodging, heat and light in the dormitory for \$2.50 per week. Roomers furnish their own linen. Young women are provided with board in private families at \$3.00 per week. Young women desiring board should address Prof. John Straub, Eugene, Oregon; or Secretary Young Women's Christian Association, Eugene. The University offers three baccalaureate degrees—Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Letters—with corresponding courses of study. The following shorter courses are also offered:—An English course leading in two years to a business diploma and in three years to the title, Graduate in English; An advanced course for graduates of normal schools leading to the degree, Master of Pedagogy; A three years' course in civil engineering leading to the degree of Civil Engineer; A course of two years for teachers of physical education leading to a diploma and the title, Director of Physical Education. The University charges incidental fee of ten dollars which is payable in advance by all students. Students holding diplomas from the public schools and those having teachers' certificates are admitted to the preparatory department without examination.
