A County Jail Mystery.

Acting upon the suggestion made in the letter, the sheriff searched the Chinaman, Harry, who is confined in jail for the China murder last summer, and found several lots of morphine upon his person.

The matter was laid before Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Phelps, who did not deem it advisable for any warrant to be issued for the one bringing the morphine into the jail.
