### Guilty of Manslaughter.

After being out but twenty minutes the jury in the case of the State vs. Lee Ching agreed upon a verdict of manslaughter. Ching was being tried for being an accomplice in the killing of marshal's report. Lock Wo upon an indictment charging him with murder in the first degree. The arguments began last evening when the prosecuting attorney made the opening argument for the state. He was followed by H. S. Wilson for the defense. This morning B. S.
