To avoid this and make returns surer, Fred has lately been fishing for them. A good stout hook is fastened to a copper wire and an anchor of some description put at the other end of the wire; the anchor is not so heavy that it cannot be hauled around, but too heavy to run off with. The hook is baited with a very tempting morsel, completely covering it, and thus arranged the trap is left over night.
