ash, technically called tufa. The assayer spoke of ore coming from that vicinity which contains a faint trace of







The Baptist church was filled last evening to hear what Rev. E. B. Sutton of Seattle had to say on A. F. A. issues. He was introduced by Rev. O. D. Taylor, through whose courtesy the use of the church was extended. Mr. Taylor disclaimed to be an A. P. A., but believed in the American feature of free speech, and having heard Rev. A., most prominent of which was the belief that it was a proscription against the religious belief of Catholics. "The object of this League shall be to protect American labor by a tariff in imports, which shall adequately secure American industrial products egainst the competition of foreign labor."


