The court explained to the jury that they were the judges as to the amount of damages they should award. In answer to the question of a juryman he said that the jury might return a verdict for the gross amount of damages awarded, including the value of the land taken, injuries resulting from the condemnation of the property, etc. The jury then retired, and soon after returned a verdict for defendant in the sum of \$2000 .- Oregonian.
