THE DURRANT CASE.

Will Actively Oppose the Bryan Ticket ing 2409 pages, and bound in three volumes, has been completed, signed by the trial judge, and is now ready for presentation before the supreme court.

NEW YORK, July 28 .- Senator Hill is now in favor of a third ticket. This information comes direct from a personal friend of the sanator, who is a prominent Democrat. The action of the Populist convention at St. Louis is what seems to have caused Hill to come to a decision as to his course. The position of the senator is thus outlined by the friend in questiou :

"Mr. Hill has been between two fires from both factions of the party for some time. He could not indorse the Chicago platform, nor could he advocate the election of any candidate who stood upon it.
