Majority of Sixty-Four Against the Measure-- Powers Promptly Moves to Recommit the Bill.

Washington, Jan. 11 .- The bill providing for the refunding of the debt of the Pacific railways was defeated in the lower house of congress today, by a vote

Powers, the author of the bill, moved to have the bill committed to the committee for revision, but a point of order was made that the motion was out of order. It]was then decided to allow the question as to whether or not Powers' motion should be granted, go over till temorrow to allow the speaker time

Washington, Jan. 11 .- Great interest was manifested in the outcome of the battle royal over the Pacific funding bill which came to a vote in the house today. Before the house convened the floor was crowded with members standing about arguing the merits of the bill. The galleries also were filled. It required some time to straighten out the parliamentary situation

Speaker Reed stated that there were no pending amendments to the bill. There were, however, two substitutes, that of Harrison of Alabama, to provide for a commission of three cabinet, officers to negotiate a settlement of the debt with the two roads, and the Bell substitute, providing that if the roads would clear off the first mortgage so as to advance the government's lien to the position of a first mortgage the government would agree to an extension of the period for payment of debt at 3 per cent interest.

Industry.

How many housekeepers, as they fil' their lamps with kcrosene oil or their summer stoves with gasoline, have any dea how these oils are made? And yet a few miles from Chicago, at Whiting. Ind., is the largest oil refinery in the

Naphtha, benzine, gasoline or kerosene, the last often called coal or illuminating oil, belong to the same family. The three first named being lighter oils, do not require nearly so much handling to bring them to perfection as the kerosene. This, of course. is easy to believe, but when it is said that from the same crude oil, after all the lighter oils have been distilled out, wax is made so closely resembling the product of the bee as to deceive ever an expert, and that it is used in chew ing gum factories, candle factories, one is often met with a polite look of go yet further, and may that hundreds of homes in Whiting and Chicago will be made comfortable this winter by the refuse that adheres to the botton and sides of the "stills" after even the wax has been proceed out. This ref use makes a good coke, is easily lighted, and is warmer, cleaner and cheaper than coal. Hundreds of tons are removed from the stills daily before they are "charged" again, and hundreds of those who use this fuel do not know that it was once crude oil, dug in the Ohio fields and piped on to Whiting.
