

If the bill introduced in the Washington legislature to quarantine Oregon sheep for a period of sixty days before permitting them to be brought into the state, becomes a law, it will work a great hardship on Eastern Oregon. With their flocks kept out of the Cascades by the national government, and forbidden the pasturage arcund Mt. Adams by the state of Washington, the sheepmen will be compelled to slaughter their flocks and go out of business. . The outlook is indeed gloomy for them. Of course Oregon could retaliate by passing quarantine laws against Washington sheep and hogs that would hurt Washington's stock men, but hurting them does not help us.

The objection is not to the foreigner, generally, because he is a foreigner, but because the labor market is overcrowded, and his coming simply makes conditions worse. We do not blame any foreigner for coming here, for the reason that wages are much higher here than in Europe, and he comes to better his condition. Wages are higher here than at home, but they are steadily approaching the European level, and will eventually reach it. The end of the journey will be reached the more quickly by permitting promiscuous immigration.

If congress desires to do anything in the matter, it should either pass a

bill that would restrict immigration in a degree, at least, or else let it alone. When wages here reach the European level, immigration will cease of its own accord, for then the laborer will not spend his money to get here, when he would be no better off than where he was-at home.
