Death of William Masters.

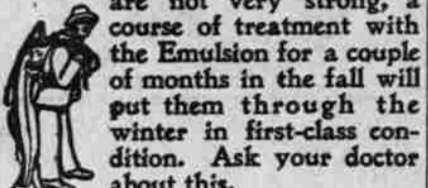

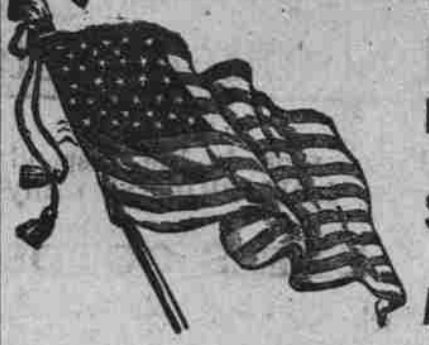
