what exaggerated. We would, however, call the attention of the members of the legislative assembly from the county to the propriety of securing an amendment to section 2341, Hill's annotated code of Oregon, which gives the sheriff \$6 per week for keeping prisoners when the number does not exceed four, and \$3 per week when the number exceeds four, Evidence is not wanting that in some instances the contractors who supply the prisoners with food receive only twelve cente per meal and for but two meals each day.

It is the opinion of this grand jury that the boarding of prisoners should. not be a source of revenue to any officer. and we believe that it would be in the interest of humanity and a saving to the county if the section referred to could be amended as to give the county court control in this matter.

We believe that any person confined in our county jail is entitled to wholesome food, pure sir and a comfortable bed, at least up to the time of his conviction.

The grand jury visited the poor farm and questioned inmates apart from the contractor, none of whom had the least complaint as to the treatment received. One lady informed us that it was just like home there, and all ot the apartments of the house seemed well ordered and cleanly.


