Death of Mrs. Ann M. Butler.

At about 1 o'clock this morning, Mrs. Ann M. Butler, mother of Leslie Butler died at the residence of Mrs. M. H. Miller, near 5-Mile.

She was born in Indiana on February 12, 1820, and was consequently 77 years, 11 months and 24 days old. 


