Suspected Child Murder.

Assistant District Attorney J. H. Lawrey returned to Pendleton Monday evening from Milton, where he was engaged in looking up a case of suspected child murder. Accompanied by Justice L. J. McIntyre, of Milton, he went to the place where the crime was reported to have been committed. Harvey Hodgins stated that his nephew, Ed Hodgins, had found the body of a child and had buried it.

In investigating the matter, a great many conflicting stories were heard. James Swash, of Walla Walla, who was the first to report the find, claimed that a number of boys had found the body and had told neighbors of it. Upon returning, it was missing. Ed Hodgins denied that he had seen the body and baried it. The stories conflicted also in the dates, some witnesses claiming the crime was committed a couple of months raised 290 bushels of turnips. ago, while others said it was committed within the last few days.


