FEWER LOBSTERS EVERY YEAR.

and Game Commissioners Report a Decrease.

Short lobsters are still being killed in large numbers. In spite of the work of the commissioners of fish and game to prevent the traffic in lobsters less than 10% inches in length, during the last eight years the lobster fisherics have steadily decreased. The last report of the commissioners, just issued. shows: In 1800 the catch of egg-bearing lobsters was 70,900; this year the ten per cent, below last year and 45 per cent, below 1890. This is not a sudden decline, but a steady one, showing that if something is not done to preserve this valuable crustacean its end is

The board says: "We recommend b shorter open season, and the prohibition of the sale of all inland game killed this commonwealth. Something should be done to prevent the pothunter and snarer from carrying on his destructive work. The taking of game with the aid of a ferret is prohibited, but the possession of a ferret in field or wood should be prima facie evidence of intent to use it.

"It is now allowed by law to kill deer during the month of November, except on the cape. As they are appearing in considerable numbers in various tions of the state, we recommend that they be protected for a term of years." The commissioners have met with success in hatching Mongolian pheasants at the Winchester breeding place, and Mr. Hobart Ames, of North Easton, and Mr. H. W. Foster, of Fitchburg, have also been successful in raising pheasants in cooperation with the board. The chief step that has been made is in the use of the brooder and incubator. It was at first thought that these could not be used to advantage with the young o so wild a bird, but after some experimenting it has been found possible to hatch 95 per cent. of the chicks, and with a little more experience it is hoped to batch them all .- Boston Transcript.


