THE CANAL SCHEME.

To Navigate Around the Rapids Above This City.

The officials of Lewiston, Idaho, are very anxious to see the Culumbia river made navigable past The Dalles. They ment to have a ship canal built around the cascades above this place, or else have a ship railway built so that ships may enter above or below the rapids. The Columbia and Snake rivers are navigable for a long distance above this city. The same is true of the Columbia from this city to salt water.
