Governor Atkinson Warned of Their Intention --- Reported Captured at New Orleans and Will Be Shot.

ATLANTA, Ga., April 28 .- Gov. Neutral Decree By England.

LONDON, April 26-A decree proclaiming nautrality was issued by the government of Great Britain and printed in the London Gazette today. This was followed by issuaing a proclamation of similar import by a majority of the British colonies in all parts of the world. As a result of the issurance of this decree, the international laws respecting vessels sailing under the flags of belligerent powers will be strictly enforced in the ports of the British empire.

FALMOUTH, England, April 26.-The United States torpedo-boat Somers has been notified that in view of the neutrality decree, she must not leave this port. A British torpedro-boat has taken up a position near here. The mail steamer Irland, said to have been purchased by the United States, has been forbidden to sail from Kingstown, Ireland.

LONDON, April 26 .- It is understood that the apparent severity of the British attitude at Hong Kong and Falmouth toward the United States war yessels between the two governments, and that the object of England is to leave no possible ground for the accusations of unfairness on the part of that government toward Spain.
