SHAFTER, PERHAPS, **WILL LAND TODAY**

The Capture of Santiago, Army and Navy Men Believe, Will Prove Easier Than Was First Expected.

NEW YORK, June 20 .- A special to the Times from Washington says:

The capture of Santiago may turn out to be easier than was expected, but preparations have been made on the assumption that the Spaniards will make a resistance equal to that which would be made by the same number of American troops holding a like position.
