> Throughout Eastern Oregon the wool market this year presents a different feature than ever before, but the outlook for fair prices is better than it was a few weeks ago, and growers may yet realize from 12 to 15 cents for their wool. Ordinarily at this season of the year there have been plenty of buyers in the field, and they were offering all the market would stand, but this season they are holding off, and are not making any offers that the growers can afford to accept, says the Long Creek Eagle. It is generally believed that the market will open up within sixty days, and that all the wool offered can be sold at some price. There is a tendency on the part of wool merchants to make advances on clips, and take wool on consignment on terms that are very fair, vet the majority of wool-growers who have consigned in the past are suspicious, they having frequently lost by consigning.
