FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., August 2 .- Four cars of the west-bound Santa Fe overland express were detailed five miles west of Winslow early this morning. Ray Gordon, the youngest son of the station agent at Kingman, and an unover forty more or less injured.

The disaster was caused by a broken rail. The engine, mail and express cars jumped the break safely, but three Pullmans, a day coach and a chair car jumped the track and plunged over a twenty-foot bank into the little Colorado river. There were fifty-three passengers on board, and hardly one escaped more or less injary.
