CHICAGO, Sept. 2 .- The Tribune this morning prints statistic; showing the number of soldiers who have been killed in battle and have died of disease during the war with Spain.

While 350 officers and men have been killed in battle or died of wounds received, there have died of disease in camp between 1200 and 2000 volunteers and regulars.

The French Cabinet Officers Realize that Comparative Figures of Those Killed in Americans Favor Holding of the Philippines.

REPORTS FROM OUR CONSULS

Majority of Peace Commission are Opposed to Giving Up Fruits of Our Victory in the Orient.

Washington, Sept. 3 -Private letters Appalling Showing Made By a Partial from our consuls abroad indicate that the Philippines must be retained if the United States desires to maintain its position in the world of nations. A very prominent officer in the consular service

"You people may as well make up your minds to be somebody or get off the earth."

These reports show that our people abroad feel that they must do something thing to maintain their position. If, after such a successful war as has been fought and won, we should sacrifice every thing we have secured, nations abroad would have very little respect for us. Our consuls not only write iu favor of the retention of Cuba, Porto Rico and the Philippines, but are also anxious that the Nicaragua canal should be built, and that a navy commensurate with the development of the country should be built and maintained.

As to the sentiment of congress and of the people, it seems to be all going one way. If Dewey had not won the great victory of May 1st at Manila, congress never would have passed the resolutions annexing the Hawaiian islands. At least, it could not have been put through at the last session of congress. The people who voted for the annexation, who had been opposed to it heretofore, did would be ours after Dewey's victory.
