The Most Reverend William H. Gross, D. D., C. SS. R., third archbishop of Oregon, was born in the city of Baltimore, EVETY Md., on June 12, 1837. The Gross fam-At the residence of Jos. Burger, in ily came originally from Alsace, and its Amer can founder, Jacob Gross, and his son, John J. Gross, took part in the defence of Bultimore in 1812.

The archbishop received his early education at the parochial school, attached to St. Vincent's church, Baltimore. In munion.

In 1857 he was invested with the religious habit and formally began his career as a Redemptorist novice. On April 3, 1858, he made his first yows, when his aim was centered upon becoming a perfect Redemptorist. In March, 1863, the deceased prelate was ordained a prelate at Annapolis, Md., by Archbishop Kenrick, of Baltimore.

He remained a part of the time as army chaplain at Annapolis. His experlences during the civil war were of a trying order. He was almost incessantly in the hospital, the field of battle, the skirmish line or the lonely outpost.

When Archbishop Gross was promoted to the archiepiscopal see of Oregon in 1885, he could point to a splendid cathedral erected by his exertions among a people of scanty means, the number of priests increased to twenty-seven, churches and chapele to thirty, institutions and orphan asylums to fourteen. 1.1m And all this was done in a Catholic population not exceeding 25,000. When Archbishop Seghers resigned in 1884, in order to devote his life more particularly to the Indian missions of particularly to the Indian missions of

the extreme Northwest the holy sea. selected Bishop Gross to succeed him. It was at his instance that the Benedictine Fathers at Mount Angel opened a college for the higher education of the young, which is advancing yearly in the number of its pupils and the efficiency of its training. Later on, at his request, a lesser and a greater seminary have been added, so that young Oregonians are now provided right at home with all the facilities needed for attaining the education, required by the church in candidates, for the priesthood.

The Christian Brothers have also been ntrod ceed into Oregon to take charge o St. Michael's college and the parachial school attached to the cathedral. Academies for the education of young ladies have increased from eight to twenty, In addition to the religious orders of women already in the diocese, six additional orders have been introduced. In other works of charity his zeal has been no less manifested.

On the 26th, 27th and 28th of last April the silver jubilate of Archbishop Gross was celebrated here. On this occasion, which was the greatest church event in the history of Oregon, a beautiful residence was presented to him.
