Regulars Otis Has, Together With Those It Is Proposed to Send Him, Ample for All Purposes.

WAR DEPARTMENT RECEIVES NOTICE

Homeward Movement of the Volunteers Therefore Will Begin Early Next Month, as Stated in the Dispatches Received Yesterday From Otis.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—Secretary Alger has received a reply from General Otis to his inquiry as to whether the reinforcements proposed to be sent to him to relieve the volunteers would be sufficient for the purposes of the campaign. Otis replied in the affirmative, the estimate of 30,000 men to constitute the army agreeing with his own calculations.

The program for the movement of the regulars out to Manila and of the volunteers homeward, therefore, will be carried out according to General Otis' statement contained in his dispatch yesterday.

General Otis adds to his message the hopeful remark that he expects very shortly to be able to report a decided improvement in the situation in the Philippines.

The volunteers in the Philippines will return home in the order in which they sailed for Manila. The date upon which each troop sailed follows:

- May 25, First California, Second Oregon and detachment California artillery; June 25, batteries A and B, Utah artillery, Tenth Pennsylvania, First Colorado and First Nebraska; June 29, First North Dakota, Thirtieth Minnesota, First Idaho and First Wyoming; July 19, First Montana; July 23, First South Dakota; October 19, First Washington; October 27, Twentieth Kansas; October 30, First Tennessee; November 3, Fifty-first Iowa; November 6, troop Nevada cavalry; November 9, First Wyoming battery.

Campaign Against the Filipinos.

New York, April 20.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Notwithstanding the presence of the hot season and the imminence of the rainy season in the Philippines, there is to be no cessation of active hostilities against the Filipinos.

This fact developed at a conference between the president, Secretary Alger, Secretary Long and Adjutant-General Corbin. It was also decided not to issue a call for the 35,000 volunteers authorized by the army reorganization law.

It is the purpose of the administration to send to the Philippines almost as many regulars as there are volunteers to be returned. There are fifteen volunteer regiments which, according to General Otis, will return home commencing May 5.

Six regular regiments are now on their way to Manila. With their departure only three infantry commands will remain in the country available for service in the East. It is understood that if conditions continue satisfactory in Cuba, a couple of regiments of infantry will be drawn from that island and the Eleventh from Porto Rico.

There is talk also of dispatching cavalry to General Otis.

THE RAILROAD ASSURED.

Work on the Grade Between Goldendale and Lyle Will Commence Immediately if Right of Way is Donated. President Lytle, of the Columbia Southern R. R. Co., was in Goldendale Saturday for the purpose of interviewing our people in regard to the immediate construction of the railroad from Lyle to Goldendale.

The company's proposition to build the proposed line is very reasonable. No bonns whatsoever is demanded of our people—the company only asking right of way and depot grounds. If the people will give these, the company bonds itself to commence grading the road not later than July 1st, but will not agree to complete the road before January 1st, 1901, although it is the desire of the company to have it completed by October 1st of this year. The road, if commenced, will be finished as quickly as possible.

We believe that the farmers whose lands are put into bad shape by the survey, are entitled to a reasonable compensation, and by that is meant no fancy price. Each one whose lands are not crossed by the survey, should lend a helping hand in procuring right of way. Some will be found who will give right of way without any consideration whatever, while others will demand outrageous compensation. The latter, it is hoped, will be few and far between, as they will but deter the building of the road and will gain nothing thereby.

With a railroad from Lyle to Goldendale, the expensive wear of farmers' wagons, harness and horses in hauling off the products of the farm will be reduced, the cost of living decreased and a greater demand created for the products of the farm. Home markets will be increased and the outside ones can be reached at all seasons of the year.

If on business or pleasure our people may wish to make a journey, how much more agreeable it will be to ride in the passenger coach of a railroad train rather than to melt in a vehicle on a hot summer day with sand and dust to contend with, or freeze in winter with muddy roads, in winter's blasts, sheets of rain, or driving snow.

Let the people unite as one with the determination to make a railroad a surety beyond question and immediately; our hopes will not have then been in vain—the long desired is assured.—Goldendale Sentinel.
