

OTIS CABLES INFORMATION

It Does Not Yet Clearly Appear What The Volunteers Will Start

WILLING TO MAKE SACRIFICE

The Transports Now Returning Carry Only the Sick and Wounded—The Volunteers First Scheduled to Return Are Now at the Front, 45 Miles From Manila.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—In reply to the cable of Assistant General Austin last night in regard to the return of volunteers, General Otis replied, this morning:

Manila, May 11.—Adjutant-General Washington: The volunteers first to return are now at Negros, and forty-five miles from Manila, at the front. It is expected that transports now arriving will take the returning volunteers.

The volunteers understood that they will begin to leave for the United States the latter part of this month, but they know the importance of their services here at this time, and accept the sacrifice, which the United States' interests make imperative. The Hancock is now entering the harbor. Transports returning this week carry sick and wounded men. The Pennsylvania and St. Paul are no longer needed in southern waters, where they have been retained, hence I dispatch transports. The Nelson and Cleveland brought freight and return without cargo. OTIS.

The Hancock, which General Otis reports as entering the harbor, sailed from San Francisco April 18, carrying the Twenty-first infantry, and light battery E, First artillery, in all 34 officers and 1450 enlisted men. Colonel Jacob Clegg, Twenty-first infantry, commanding.

Later dispatches from General Otis say:

Manila, May 11.—Adjutant-General Washington: The health conditions of the troops that arrived on the Hancock are excellent, there being but two deaths en route, those of Private Dno E. Jones and Elmer H. Chetler, companies L and B, Twenty-first infantry, April 24 and 26. OTIS.

Progress Being Made.

Still another cablegram was received, as follows: Manila, May 11.—Adjutant-General Washington: The situation is as follows: We have received a passing army ambulance to Chamboog for use in the E. O. Grand. Railway connections with that point were stopped this week. The passage of the graduates through the Mucabe country was halted with just demonstrations by the inhabitants. In the country passed over by the troops,

temporary civil administration was inaugurated, and protection to inhabitants against insurgents' attacks given as far as possible. Signs of the insurgents' disintegration are daily manifested. The obstacles which the natural features of the country present can be overcome. OTIS.

MORE FLOOD PREDICTIONS.

What Future Says Regarding It—Comparison by Years.

In spite of contrary predictions, future insists we are to have a flood. He says that it will reach the 26-foot mark at least in Portland, and that he wouldn't be surprised if the collars on Front street were flooded in ten days.

The country has been gradually climbing up in the Snake river country during the past few days, and as a result the Snake has risen two feet since the warmer days set in. May weather at 90 and 100 degrees is not unusual in that part of the country. If such weather should prevail there from now on, the Snake river could soon be as high as the oldest inhabitants could remember having seen it. This, however, does not necessarily mean a flood. On the contrary, it may prevent a flood.

The Snake river usually goes on a "low" about two weeks earlier than the Columbia, and the fact that it is starting out first this year is reassuring. The only trouble is it is late in the season, and hot weather may set in any day all over the country.

All reports received at the weather bureau show that there is as much snow up in the mountainous tributary to the streams flowing into the Columbia as there was April 1, 1894. This snow must pass off to the sea within the next few weeks, and if it all decides to go at about the same time there will be trouble all along the river.

The river here this morning stood at 20.7, a rise of nearly two feet since yesterday. The following comparisons will no doubt prove interesting to our readers, as they show the stage of the river on May 12th for the past eight years, and the date of the highest water for those years:

HIS HEAD ALMOST BLOWN OFF

Hugh Hoffman Accidentally Shot at 15-Mile Tuesday.

A very sad and fatal accident happened Tuesday afternoon at 15-Mile, news of which was brought to the city last evening by a neighbor, who came in to inform Mr. Hoffman of the terrible death of his son, Hugh, at that place last evening, between the hours of 4 and 6 o'clock.

Hugh Hoffman, who was 12 years of age, and who has been making his home with the family of C. W. Emerson on 15 Mile, started on horseback about 4 o'clock for Moe's place, some miles distant, on an errand for Mrs. Emerson, who had been called to Rockland on account of the illness of her little grandson, and which she asked him to do before leaving.

Although being warned frequently, he took his double barreled shotgun with him. He reached his destination and accomplishing his errand, started away in good spirits. Toward evening one of the Moe boys saw his horse standing near by, and fearing some thing had happened to Hugh, he at once went in search of him, and found his little body lying by a marking machine, and the top of his head was about blown off, a shot having entered just above the left ear.

As he had told one of the boys that he had left his gun lying on the machine, it is supposed as he attempted to lift it up one the cocks got caught and was discharged, with the dreadful result. Word was immediately sent in to his father, who is a laborer in this city, and he left last night for Mr. Emerson's residence, where he arrived this morning for the scene of the accident to hold an inquest, the result of which will be published tomorrow.
