On Carload Lots.

A circular has been issued by the O. R. & N. announcing changes in freight rates effective July 1 which are in favor of the jobbers. All special commodity rates in effect between local points on the company's lines and subject to the minimum of 24,000 pounds per car.

The circular announces that the Western Classification No. 29 to be published effective July 1, 1899, will contain a number of important changes. Particular attention is called to rule No 6 which will read as follows:

"Carload freight will be rated and charged according to the current rules governing maximum and minimum weights of carloads, as authorized by the companies adopting this classification, but in no case, unless especially provided for in the classification, will a carload be considered less than 20,000 pounds, or freight rated in carloads, third class and higher, and 30,000 pounds on freight rated in carloads lower than third class. Provisions for carload rating shown in the classification will apply only upon shipments received in one day from one consignee, under one bill of lading, and delivered under one expense bill to one consignee. Carload rates are not applicable on freight consigned to railroad agents."

THEY LOST VERY HEAVILY

The Usual Result Follows a Rebel Attack.

FILIPINO ARMS CAPTURED

Five Killed, Twenty-Five Wounded in Our Total List of Casualties.

MANILA, June 19.—A battalion of the Fourth Infantry, which left Imus with General Wheaton in command this morning to reconnoiter toward Pedas Desmarin, was attacked in the rear by apparently friendly natives. This brought on a sharp engagement lasting several hours and five Americans being killed and twenty-five wounded. The loss of the rebels was very heavy.

The battalion soon exhausted its ammunition and Wheaton and his staff with two mountain guns and one field piece went to reinforce the troops which were attacked. General Wheaton was fired on in the road and had a narrow escape.

The third battalion was ordered to the front and formed on the Las Minas road. Heavy firing on both sides followed, artillery being freely used. The enemy was located in the woods at 4 o'clock, showing signs of retreating as the rebels were pressed very hard. One gun of the Sixth artillery did great execution.

The fighting was still in progress at 5 o'clock, at which time the Americans had secured a quantity of Filipino arms which had been abandoned in the woods. The scene of the fighting is 20 miles from Manila.

Offered a Regiment.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—The war department today received a telegram signed by Senators Perkins and White offering for immediate service in the Philippines a full regiment of infantry from Southern California. No action can be taken in the matter. The question of calling for volunteers has not been determined, besides it has not been decided whether state troops would be accepted, should volunteers be called for.

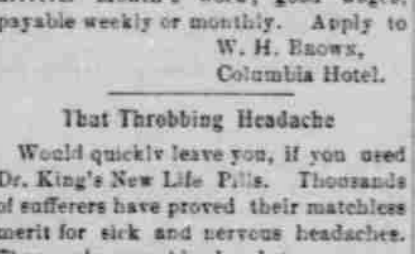
