THE LAST RIVER CROSSED. John Irvine, a Proneer of '52 Dies His Rome in This City.

Yet another ploneer has made the last long journey, compared with which all others are nothing. The final river has been crossed and "sweet helds beyond the swelling flood" burst upon the view of one who was among those who in early years sought the West as his abiding place and to whom the view of the Pullman rivers of the Pacific const must have been as a very one is after months of weary travel through barren plains. But forty. Elegant seven years have passed since that time and in those years John Irvine had Tourist passed from a young man of 26 years, with life before him, to the ripe years of three-score and thirteen, for on his last birthday he was 73 years old.

For five years he has been a continuous sufferer from consumption, and for over a year the end has been expected almost daily. No doubt it was hoped for by him who grew weary of the tedious months of pain, and who welcomed the hour shortly after noon yesterday which brought him relief.


