ALL FAIR IN "LOVE AND LAW."

And More Than Fair Was the Shaw Company Last Night. Thursday's Daily.

"Love and Law" which was not on the boards by the Shaw Company last night was perhaps the strongest yet given, from the fact that it required so much character work, which always tests the strength of a cast. We must say, however, that they stood the test well, for 'tis not often a company is found containing so many artists in the character line; one that can put seven almost faultless character artists on in one play, each one seeming to thoroughly understand the part and enter into the spirit of it, from the Italian organ-grinder, which we consider an extremely difficult role and perfectly taken by Al. H. Hallett, to the Dutch policeman. In make-up, dialect, manner and acting Mr. Hallett was certainly immense, and succeeded in making all despise him. In Mrs. Shaw, as "Old Rosa," he had support none the less perfect. The conscientious work of the lady in every character she assumes is apparent, and in last night's performance it would be difficult to imagine one who could surpass her. Of Mr. Shaw as "Felix O'Paff," an Irish attorney, we can but reiterate what was said of his first performance. So perfect is his understanding of every character he has so far appeared in here, that his audience is at once charmed with him and then led to study his rendition of each character. He is one of the most fascinating actors Dalles people have ever heard. "Cockney Jim" was a splendid role when in the hands of M. J. Hooley, who played it for all there was in it. He is all right and such was the verdict of the audience. Jennie Kelton also had a difficult part in Retta, the street singer, but she met every requirement and showed herself equal to a heavy part as well as lighter ones, in which she had previously appeared. As Kittie O'Rourke, the Irish servant, Louise Carter was "too cute for anything" as a young lady was heard to remark. While her brogue might have been improved upon, her make-up and her acting were the "real thing." The audience did not blame her for admiring Policeman Hoffmeister, for Dan Dougherty was "one of the finest," and is also a high stepper. Stanley Ross had the thankless part of a villain, and it was hard to make the audience believe he was the same person who assumed the roll of the charming lover the first night, so much of a villain was he. Although it would not seem so, H. W. Gilbert had a role difficult to take, as much depends on the ease with which a lover's part is carried out, and he was perfectly at home as Sir Randall Burns. Albert Watson as "Septimus Sawyer" also acted the part of the lawyer well. Those who have heard Miss Myer in the previous performances were better pleased with her in last night's play, for she seemed more at home. Due allowance must be made for her, however, as this is her first appearance in this repertoire, having just joined the company here, and being compelled to learn a new role each day. She is said to be a first class actress when at her best. Her make-up was also better last night, she being inclined to use too much make-up for this stage. A little less rouge, as well as powder, would add to her appearance. The play which Mr. Shaw has selected for this evening is the story of Cuba's struggle for freedom, "The Last Stroke." It can hardly be called a war drama. "A dramatic incident in a war setting" would be a more accurate description of it. But what's in a name? A play by any other name would be as good (if presented by the Shaw company) so get your seats early and you will not be compelled to stand up.

WILL HAVE MEDALS.

Governor Geer Proposes to Reward the Volunteers.

Gov. T. T. Geer has conceived the idea of giving each volunteer of the Second Oregon regiment a memento of their campaign, and one which will be cherished by every soldier as a keepsake during life, and an heirloom to hand down to posterity. The governor proposes to secure, from General Shafter, a bronze cannon, captured in the Philippines, to be made up into medals, and ever member of the regiment is to receive one of the medals from the state. For the purpose of having the medals as soon as possible, the governor Tuesday addressed the following to General Shafter, at the Presidio, San Francisco, and he will doubtless hear from that officer in a few days. "My Dear Sir: I have decided to have made, for each of the returning Oregon volunteers, a bronze medal as a memento of the appreciation we have of their heroic services in the Philippine war. It has occurred to me that it would be a very appropriate thing to secure, if possible, a captured cannon (captured at the Philippine islands) from which to make the medals. "I write to know if you could aid me in securing such cannon, as it is desired to have the work done as soon as possible.
