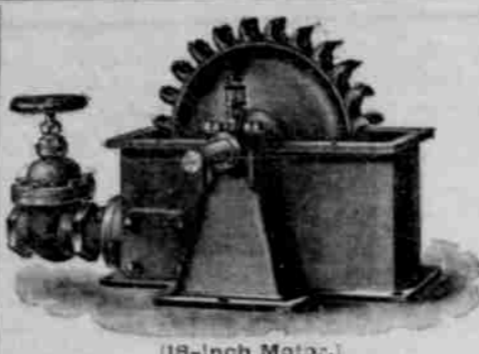
Mrs. F. B. Prater Dead.

SALEM, Sept. 3.—Mrs. F. B. Prater, aged 75, a pioneer of 1852, died at her home in Yew Park today, of dropsy. She was a member of the Oregon Pioneer Association. She was born in 1821, and had been married three times. She left six children—J. J. Kendall, Astoria; E. C. Kendall, Athena; Mrs. J. W. Privett, Pendleton; Mrs. E. R. Skipworth, Eugene; Mrs. M. E. Bourgardee, Spokane, and Miss Lyda Willett, Salem. Arrangements for the funeral will be made tomorrow.

PENDLETON, Or., Sept. 3.—At 4 o'clock this morning a fire occurred at W. P. Temple's farm, ten miles north of this place, burning 18 horses, 40 tons of hay, several wagons, a quantity of grain, 34 sets of harness, and the barn in which all the property was.
