

TARTAR FINALLY ALLOWED TO GO

Transport Granted Clearance Papers at Hong Kong Today

WILL PROCEED HOME AT ONCE

London Officials Had Refused to Interfere, Leaving Matter in Hands of Hong Kong Harbor-master, Who Declined to Let Troopship Depart.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—The war department received a dispatch today containing the information that clearance papers have been allowed the transport Tartar at Hong Kong.

It is expected that she will proceed to the United States at once.

Refused to Interfere.

New York, Sept. 14.—A dispatch to the World from London says: The British local officials have declined to take any action upon the United States Consul Wildman's protest against the detention of the American transport Tartar. This leaves the matter entirely in the hands of the Hong Kong harbor-master, who positively declines to allow the transport to sail with more than 750 soldiers on board.

Many of these volunteers have been permitted to come ashore from the Tartar. Some of them met a man named E. A., who it was said had taught the Filipinos how to use machine guns.

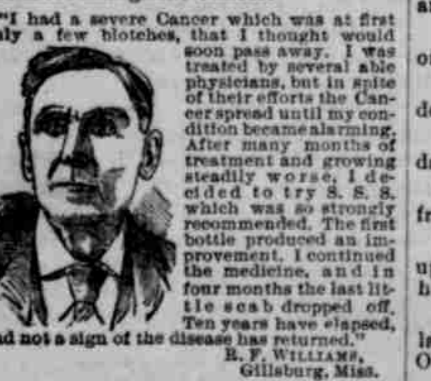
Negro Lynched by a Mob.

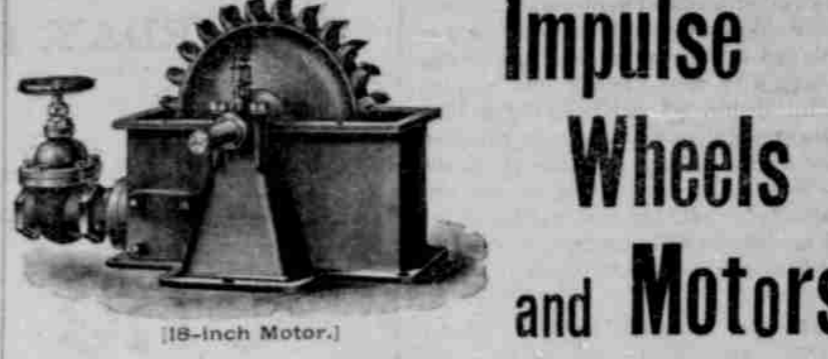
