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SEWER QUESTION DISCUSSED.

At the Council Meeting Last Night—Cows May Run at Large.
Counselors Keller, Clough, Johns, Gunning, Stephens, Johnston, Shackelford, Kelly and Wilson were all present at the adjourned regular meeting of the council last night, when some important city business was transacted.
The question of improving Federal street on the bluff was first brought up, and the marshal was instructed to commence work at once. Grade stakes will be put in today and work began tomorrow.
Several years ago when there was a case of smallpox in the city and it was decided to move the patient to the pest house, which was then surrounded with residences, the people there objected so strongly that a new one was built farther out near the cave. Last night the marshal was instructed to take charge of the old house situated near the reservoir, and rent it if possible.
On motion of Johnston the petition of B. F. Laughlin and others, praying for the right to put in a side track on First street was granted.

"We desire to call your attention to the fact that an amendment to the constitution of Oregon, giving full suffrage to every adult woman in the state, is to be submitted to your vote in June, 1900.
