Article two of this convention provides that "the respective Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls or Consular Agents, as well as their Chancellors and Secretaries, shall enjoy in the two countries all privileges, exemptions and immunities which have been granted or Drying preparations simply devel may in future be granted to the agents of the same rank of the most favored nations." If it should be ascertained that consuls of other nations accredited to Germany are getting the information desired by the Consular Representatives of the United States, then the claim can be advanced that the latter are not allowed the privileges "accorded to other

In the treaty of 1828, with Prussia, the two contracting parties grant each other the liberty of Consular representation and the Consuls "shall enjoy the same privileges and powers as those of the most favored nations." Other states of the German confederation have treaties with the United States containng provisions of like character. No complaint can be made to the German government at the action of the authoriiles in refusing information, but if, as stated, the refusal shall be especially directed against the United States, then complaint can and will be made.

The authorities are not inclined to the belief that the restrictions imposed by the governor of Dusseldori were prompted by the Berlin government, but were rather the act of an official who desired o make political capital with the Agrarian party.


