Captain Bishop states that the pressure for relief supplies is greater today than it was before the hurricane. In some sections they are beginning to raise sweet potatoes, but in the center of the island, or the coffee district, there is nothing for the poor to eat. Bananas and plantains will not be ready for from two to four months. If the rations are not continued, Captain Bishop states, there is almost certain to be an outbreak of lawlersness and an increase of illness and the death rate. He says he had hoped to reduce the rations, but reports from all sections of the district indicate increased destitution.


