Boers Withdraw Unopposed. LONDON, April 26—The Times has the following from a special correspondent, dated Mafeking, Basutoiland, April 25:

"I rode from Jammersburg here, skirting Wepener, and I met General Brabant's advance guard four miles south of Wepener. They report three successful fights Saturday, Sunday and Tuesday, with twenty-two casualties. The siege was raised, and 5000 of the enemy retired along the Ladybrand road within our sight and unopposed. Colonel Dalgety's casualties are 33 killed and 132 wounded."

BOERS WILL FINALLY ESCAPE

Ruddle Is Pursuing Them in Forced Marches—British Hope for Successful Conclusion of the Chase Said to Be Small.

LONDON, April 26.—A special dispatch from De Wet's Dorp, dated yesterday, says: "Owing to the approach of General French and to General Ruddle's persistent shelling, the Boers relinquished their positions last night, retiring with their guns in a northerly direction. Generals French and Ruddle joined hands east of De Wet's Dorp this morning. General Ruddle is pursuing the Boers in forced marches.

LONDON, April 26—1:53 p. m.—The war office has received the following message from Lord Roberts: "Bloemfontein, April 26.—Good news from Baden-Powell up to April 10th. McLaren is much better. All the wounded are doing well. The Boers captured several native women who were trying to escape from Mafeking, but these were returned later."

Punishing Inconstant Free Staters. BLOEMFONTEIN, April 26.—General Pole-Carew's forces are seven miles north of De Wet's Dorp today. They are disappointed at the failure to surround the Boers, but believe the march will have a good effect on the Free Staters. The latter, trusting to British leniency, had played the game of pretending to surrender and of taking every opportunity to fight. Wherever he found Free Staters who had broken the oath, General Pole-Carew seized their cattle and horses.

Favor Emigration of Indians. WASHINGTON, April 26.—The House committee on Indian affairs today direct a favorable report on the bill allowing Indians in the Indian Territory to emigrate to Mexico, the emigration to be under the direction of the secretary of the interior, and in bands of 300. Mexico gives the Indians an opportunity to return to their tribal relations and nomadic habits, and they prefer this to the restrictions now imposed upon them, and also as a means of avoiding the spread of tuberculosis and other diseases which have decimated them of late.
