A MESSAGE TO MANILA.

Travels Three-Fifths the Circuit of the Globe—The Course It Takes. To pay practically \$25 for a brief ten-week message to the Philippines may seem extravagant, but when one reflects that it travels three-fifths of the distance around the globe in completing the journey, passing under the direction of half a dozen different companies, the cost seems far from exorbitant, says Alaska's Magazine. The ordinary course of such a message would be from New York to Cape Breton, N. S., thence to Henry's Content, N. F., where it dives under the Atlantic, to reappear on the coast of Ireland. From here it is forwarded to London, which is the great center and clearing house for the cable business of the whole world. From London the message will be forwarded either across the English channel and overland to Marseilles, or by the Eastern Telegraph company's line around the Spanish peninsula, stopping at Lisbon. Through the Mediterranean the route leads to Alexandria, across Egypt by land, down the Red sea to Aden, through the Arabian sea to Bombay, over India by land, across the Bay of Bengal to Singapore, along the coast to Hong-Kong, and across the China sea to Manila. Notwithstanding the many hands through which it passes, the message is forwarded with reasonable promptness, with perfect secrecy and all the way in English. Change in O. R. & N. Time Card. Passengers for all points on the Columbia Southern Railway, via Biggs and Heppner branch points, also all points east via Huntington, should take this train. Train No. 4, known as the Spokane flyer, at 3:25 p. m., stops at all way points between The Dalles and Umatilla. Train No. 6, mail and express, 12:40 a. m., for all points east via Huntington, stops only at Grants, Arlington and way stations east of Umatilla. Freight trains will not carry passengers except those holding regular freight train permits form 208. Phenomenal Weather.

Chicago, May 14.—Yesterday was the hottest May 13th in weather history in this city for at least twenty-eight years. While the mercury at the weather bureau recorded 86 degrees, street thermometers in the shade all over the city registered 90 degrees and some of the more ambitious recorders touched the 92 mark. The weather reports over the country revealed the following temperatures: Winnipeg, 92; St. Paul, 90; Milwaukee, 89; Des Moines, 88; Omaha, 88.
